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What We Teach

We teach how to tell your story to persuade and motivate others; how to recruit and retain volunteers; how to structure your team to encourage leadership development; and how to strategize and choose tactics that build power.

Our curriculum comes from Marshall Ganz, a Harvard professor who codified the relationship – building organizational framework we teach after the years he spent organizing the Civil Rights and United Farm Workers movements. He was a key trainer and organizing strategist behind President Obama's presidential campaigns. The Institute offers the first accredited Marshall Ganz-based community-organizing course in Canada.

Who We Are

Founded in 2016 by Olivia Chow and based at Ryerson University, the Institute for Change Leaders teaches the skills that organizers need in order to win social change. Olivia and her team of 30+ trainers have taught community and political organizing to a network of almost four thousand organizers since launching.

We believe students learn best when they practice what they learn. We deliver our full curriculum in regular weekend sessions at Ryerson University, and we work with organizations such as unions, nonprofits, and social service agencies to deliver tailored training in their gathering places.

Letter from our Founder Building Resilience

Building strong relationships with those who share our values is at the core of our teaching at ICL. It's how movements build power, and how we build resilience in times of uncertainty, fear and disruption.

Our work at ICL—of equipping new leaders with the skills and knowledge they need to make change— has continued during the Covid-19 pandemic through online workshops, with active participation and small group coaching sessions, using video conferencing services.

In fact, it's been our busiest year ever: we've trained nearly 2,000 new activists just this year, and formed partnerships with 25 new organizations across Canada and the United States.

These aren't just numbers. Each person who we work with leaves with a more profound understanding of their own personal story, a deeper sense of their own power, and the skills to put that power into action to make a change in their communities.

With your support, we've made an incredible impact this year, helping a movement of early childhood educators win millions for childcare in Ontario, working with black youth from across Ontario to develop their leadership skills and confront anti-Black racism in their communities, and partnering with long-term care workers to fight for better conditions for seniors and better pay for those on the front line of the crisis.

The pandemic continues to do enormous damage, and the struggle to shape our post-COVID future will be intense, but it's difficult not to feel hopeful when working with such amazing groups of activists and organizers.



This year we were proud to continue our partnership with For Youth Initiative (FYI), a non-profit organization that serves teens and young adults in York South-Weston, to deliver the Black Youth Leadership Program. This three-month program worked with Black youth from across Ontario to develop their leadership skills and confront anti-Black racism in their communities. A letter from Elijah and Monica

We found our own story

Over the past few months, the Black Lives Matter movement has finally come to light for the public but has always been the forefront issue in the Black community. Our involvement with the Black Youth Leadership Program has been a refuge for us amidst the global pandemic. It has given us a feeling of belonging, especially living in a world where it's rare to see people who look like us succeed.

A main aspect of the program, aside from learning how to fight injustices and gathering resources, was understanding the importance of storytelling. In learning the fundamentals of connecting to people through a story, we can not only recruit others but build meaningful bonds to eventually unite to make a difference.

After completing the program as participants and becoming facilitators, we have found our own story and work to help others discover their own story and use that drive to take action to be the change they need to see. We are using our new and refined skills to continue to combat the injustice Black people fight and work to inspire others to join and change the status quo.

The community must act now to stop the suffering of the Black community, it must act now so the education system stops becoming a pipeline to jail for black youth, it must act now so people stop using stereotypes to judge our character and potential. The community must act now before it's too late to save Black pride.

Winning Big

with Early Childhood Educators

In early April, ICL partnered with the Association of Early Childhood Educators of Ontario (AECEO), with generous support from the Blue Sky Foundation, to run a months-long online training for over 200 early childhood educators (ECEs) and parents to provide them the skills they need to build power, confidence and solidarity. It was an amazing journey, and privilege to work with such an inspiring, dedicated group of changemakers.

Ten days after completing our training, ECEs held a Virtual Rally of 1,500 participants and over 20,000 viewers demanding a reopening plan that ensured quality and safety for all.

The government had no choice but to act.

In July, the Government of Canada announced \$625 million in federal funding for the child care sector. In early September, Ontario's child care sector received a \$147 million funding boost to offset costs linked to COVID-19 pandemic. And in the September Speech From the Throne, the Federal Government announced a commitment

to "a significant, long-term, sustained investment to create a Canada-wide early learning and childcare system."

The AECEO called it a "bold statement which shows the power of advocacy and raising our collective voice."

"I still remember how discouraged I was when I first began working as an early childhood educator. The waitlist was disgraceful, the paycheque wasn't enough to start a family, and parents were struggling to afford ever-rising costs.

As a young woman beginning my career, I did not know how to face such an enormous challenge.

That's when I discovered Olivia Chow's course. The Institute for Change Leaders taught me the skills I needed to win lasting change. With Olivia's energy and expertise, we trained and launched teams of early childhood educators who have in turn engaged thousands of childcare workers and reached tens of thousands of parents and voters." rank-and-file power with essential workers



These are tough times for long-term care (LTC) workers, who have fought for years for better working conditions and pay, and are now on the front lines of the Covid-19 pandemic.

That's one reason the Institute for Change Leaders stepped this summer up to host a series of connect-and-share sessions, where LTC workers were able to build solidarity over storytelling, conversation and laughs.

The sessions gave an outlet for frontline workers. They also came up with strategies and tactics on how to fix long term care so seniors can live in dignity, and workers get decent wages with stable, rewarding employment.

We're so excited to be playing a part in the fight for decent and stable work for everyone in the health-care sector by empowering these essential workers with the skills they need to organize their coworkers, tell their story with confidence, strategize, and take action.

Terry is a family advocate for better conditions in long-term care. She joined ICL's connect-and-share to learn how to use the power of her family's story to further her advocacy.

Terry started volunteering alongside long-term care workers after moving her mother into a long-term care home. Years of underfunding by the government led to severe leaks in the roof of her mother's facility in February 2019, forcing elderly residents to evacuate.

"I got my mother into her heavy winter coat and we went down to the lobby to wait. The front entrance was just a constant scene of frail and elderly residents in their wheelchairs.

My mum didn't really understand where she was going. She trusted me. She looked at me with faith in her eyes, that I would take care of her.

I only knew she was going to long-term care an hour and a half drive from where we lived. I knew nothing about the home. How would they treat her? I had no say, I had no control. My mom's well-being was completely taken out of my hands.

The tragedy is that this disaster didn't have to happen. Why should our elders, who look to us in the end for care, not even have a safe roof over their heads?

It's time for us, for me, to stand up, give my voice, and act for those who've done some much for us, but have so little voice themselves."

Building skills, Finding passion,

Making change



We're in a unique time. There are millions of people, in Canada and around the world, who feel anger or frustration at the injustices around them but have no sense of how things can really change.

That's one reason we are so proud to host *Building Skills for Change*, our flagship two-day training program that anyone can sign up for. Students learn the fundamentals of community organizing, centered on five key leadership practices: telling stories, building relationships, structuring teams, strategizing, and taking action.

They leave with the ability to persuade and motivate others, recruit and retain volunteers structure their team of leaders for growth, and identify how power operates, and choose tactics that move decision-makers.

It's our job to help people find their source of strength and hope, and build power to take action for the first time. We've worked with hundreds of ordinary people and witnessed many of their victories, big and small, after taking our course.
