

\$2M Van Andel Hope & Healing Pavilion opens

Faith Hospice recently opened the doors to the Van Andel Hope & Healing Pavilion, thanks to the leadership of Amy Van Andel, a former Faith Hospice nurse and patient advocate. Occupying the entire lower level of Trillium Woods, the region's only inpatient hospice facility, the \$2.1 million grief support and staff respite center places all Faith Hospice staff under one roof while expanding grief and respite services for the community.

The Van Andel Hope and Healing Pavilion has been created from inspiration of Bereavement Manager, Janet Jaymin, and NFL official and West Michigan resident, Carl Paganelli, after Janet walked with Carl on his grief journey when his wife, Cathy, died in 2016. Their vision and mission was to create a peaceful, private environment for those grieving as they seek grief counseling.

Amy Van Andel, Carl Paganelli, Nancy Erhardt, and the late Dan Pfeiffer, served as campaign co-chairs to spearhead and complete a \$2 million fundraising campaign to create this much-needed center.

The Van Andel name is a continuation of the family's involvement with Holland Home, which dates back to 1998 when the Van Andel Pavilion was constructed at Holland Home's former Fulton Manor location with funds donated in honor of Betty Van Andel, who suffered from Alzheimer's disease. Transferring the name from the former Fulton location was a natural fit. The Van Andel family will continue to honor their parents, and the Van Andel Hope and Healing Pavilion will carry on the tradition to provide "shelter" to the hearts of those grieving.

René Wheaton BSN, RN, NHA, Executive Vice President of Home and Community Based Services at Holland Home stated "Every day and every night, our mission calls upon us to provide compassionate care in Christ's name. Since our first day 25 years ago, we have worked tirelessly to live up to that calling by caring for the physical, emotional, and spiritual needs of those facing life's final journey — as well as providing care and support to their loved ones grieving their loss."

Built in 2006, Trillium Woods, located in Byron Center, offers 20 private rooms and a peaceful, family-centered atmosphere with 24/7 medical care. The completion of this project allows all Faith Hospice staff and volunteers to work under one roof.

Key new facility features:

- Grief Support Center
 Space for individual grief counseling, group and family counseling, and community seminars and education.
- Hospice Training & Education Lab
 Training for staff and volunteers through role playing and skills testing, allowing for enhanced care experiences for patients and their loved ones.
- Staff Respite & Renewal Center
 A soothing and healing space for staff to unwind and decompress.
- Consolidated Office Space

 All Faith Hospice staff are now under one roof—
 allowing better patient-care collaboration regardless
 of whether they are inpatient at Trillium Woods or
 living in our community.

West Michigan residents, Ken and Yogi Kits, have deep ties to Faith Hospice through the passing of three parents who experienced hospice care. Ken's mother and Yogi's father were patients at Trillium Woods, and Yogi's mother received care at a local care facility where she resided.

"The care that all three of our parents received from the Faith Hospice staff was beyond belief," states Yogi. "We could not be more grateful. I stayed with my dad at Trillium the last week of his life. The staff cared for him and me with such tenderness. It was like having an angel coming alongside and helping!"

"Based on our experiences, we have recommended Faith Hospice to several families who needed hospice care for a loved one," said Ken. "Beyond that, we donate to Faith Hospice out of gratitude. We received help and we want to help other families by giving to patient assistance." Recently the Kits informed us that Faith Hospice will eventually receive a gift through their trust. "As we reviewed our estate plan it made sense to include Faith Hospice. It is definitely God's work, and we will continue to give each year. We also want to see that the care continues long after we are gone."

Prior to retirement Ken worked as a structural engineer for 38 years mainly in the Chicago area. Yogi attended Calvin University for two years until their marriage in 1970 and then was a stay-at-home-mom raising their daughter and two sons. They moved to west Michigan in 2012 and enjoy spending time with their grandchildren and great granddaughter.
